About J-PAL and DigiFI Africa

<u>J-PAL</u> is an international research centre that works to reduce poverty by ensuring that policy is informed by rigorous evidence. J-PAL works with top academic economists, governments, the private sector, and other stakeholders to conduct randomised evaluations to understand the impact of social programmes.

<u>DigiFI Africa</u> is part of J-PAL and focuses on funding rigorous evidence on the use of digital payments and identification systems to improve lives in sub-Saharan Africa. Policymakers across Africa are increasingly investing in large-scale digital identification and digital payment systems. Because these systems are new, little rigorous research exists on how best to design and implement such systems in low-income contexts. How do these rapid changes affect the lives of citizens? How can they best be structured to lead to the most benefit? Are any groups adversely affected by these reforms? DigiFI clusters research around these questions, creating and funding randomized evaluations, monitoring systems, and pilots, and generating results that provide guidance on critical design questions as reforms go to scale.

DigiFI funds local scholars' research projects on digital identification and payment systems in Africa and local scholars are especially encouraged to apply for research funding. It also provides training and scholarships. DigiFI provides funding to:

- Resident African Scholars those who have completed a PhD and are based in an African academic institution.
- Non-resident African Scholars those who completed high school in Africa, have a PhD, and are based in an academic institution outside of Africa.
