Improving worker well-being with on-the-job support

In a new Policy Insight, J-PAL's [Firms](#) sector summarizes evidence from 21 rigorous evaluations to understand how workplace initiatives can create safer, healthier, and more productive workplaces.

Policy Issue: Nearly three million workers die globally from work-related diseases and

accidents each year. Workers in many regions face low wages, limited career advancement, and gender-based bias and harassment.

Results: Workplace policies like better safety measures, empowering workers to share feedback, and skill training improved workers' health and job satisfaction. These measures often led to higher productivity and lower turnover, sometimes benefiting firms with greater returns. However, evidence linking increased productivity to higher pay for workers remains weak, suggesting that while such policies can boost firm performance, ensuring that workers share in these gains is an unsolved challenge. Preventing disease by improving access to toilets

In a new Policy Insight, J-PAL's [Health](#) sector reviews 27 randomized evaluations across fourteen countries of programs that used information campaigns, subsidies, and loans to improve sanitation.

Policy issue: Defecation in the open or in unsanitary facilities spreads disease, contaminates water, and poses serious risks to public health. However, hundreds of millions of people face barriers to accessing and using improved toilets.

Results: Programs that informed communities about how open defecation can harm their health or lowered the costs of building toilets improved people's access to and use of toilets. Even with these improvements, programs fell short of ensuring that everyone had access to toilets and had limited impacts on people's health. Still, these programs can help reduce open defecation while governments pursue more comprehensive piped sanitation systems, which have greater potential to minimize disease. Changing perceptions of child marriage through edutainment

📍 Indonesia

Policy issue: Despite improvements in girls' education and socioeconomic conditions, child marriage persists in many low- and middle-income countries, with approximately 12 million girls married before the age of eighteen each year.

Evaluation: Researchers evaluated the impact of short “edutainment” (educational entertainment) films—focused on the costs of child marriage and the benefits of delaying it—on adolescent girls’ and their parents’ perceptions about child marriage.

Results: The study found that the short films, both with and without alternative religious perspectives, led girls and their parents to have more negative views about child marriage.
