## A practical framework for evidence-informed policy: Addressing the generalizability puzzle

Is a specific policy or program shown to be successful in one place likely to succeed in another? In an article just published in the *Stanford Social Innovation Review*, J-PAL Executive Director Rachel Glennerster and J-PAL North America Deputy Executive Director Mary Ann Bates present a practical framework for policymakers to use when deciding whether a particular approach makes sense in their context.

The long-standing debate of whether results from randomized evaluations can be translated to different contexts, the authors argue, is often presented as a false choice that obscures both the nuances of policymaking and the value of research in making informed decisions. [Read more »](#)

While young adults in many contexts struggle to develop a positive identity or skills such as self-control, those who grow up in low-income or violent settings may have more at stake and receive less support. Cognitive behavioral therapy, an intervention traditionally used to treat mental health disorders like depression, is a promising option for policymakers seeking low-cost solutions to crime and violence.
